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**Comments by the Chairperson**

Chairman Jay Hood, Jr.

So, it's really hard to know where to start. But first, I would like to thank everybody for coming out tonight. It's great to see so many people in the chambers, we have so many meetings and there's really no one here. Whether you agree with us or disagree with us, I'm glad to see you here today. I feel bad for all the people that are standing outside. I wish you could all be here in the Chambers with us. You know, maybe we could have had a different venue, because I really didn't plan for that many people honestly, but maybe next time we'd have to have it somewhere else.

So where to start? You know, we have a very emotional issue that was on tonight regarding our immigrant population concerning ICE and their behavior. I believe this was brought to us by the sponsors, because of things that are happening in Minnesota. I speak for myself here, and everybody else will have a chance to speak as well on this dais. I don't like what I see in Minnesota. I don't like halfway trained officers wearing masks going around with impunity. I cannot fathom that it is okay in America. I think of the two people that were killed recently and I hope that people are held accountable for those actions.

So that brings us to the item of the day. I believe there's a lot of misinformation out there. I don't want to call them lies, but let's call it what it is. I think there's a lot of misinformation about what was brought before us and it stirred the pot. This Legislation, if passed at some point, does not make us a Sanctuary County. This same legislation has been in Westchester since 2018, and they are not listed as a Sanctuary County. So, I hate to say it, but I think people were lied to. Let's just say how it is, all right, people were lied to.

Next, it does not stop ICE from coming in, doing their job, doing their job properly, doing their job with judicial warrants, not administrative warrants. That is how I want to see it.

So next I have to look at the population that we're talking about here. I represent Haverstraw, the Village of Haverstraw and the Village of West Haverstraw. You can imagine there are undocumented immigrants there more than are counted. We don't even know probably how many are there, but they deserve protection. If you want to come in and take out all the criminals from Haverstraw, let the police come in and that's when there's a criminal investigation, a criminal charge or even a conviction, but it should all be dealt with appropriately. But the people that I know, the people that I run into every day in my office and around where I live, are hardworking people that come here for a better life.

Now look, you can say, well, they're criminals because they came over the border without, you know, without permission. Well, you know what? Make the process easier! Fix the process because I hear it takes eight years to get over here legally. And then I hear the argument; well, you know, our grandparents came over, great grandparents came over here and they did it right. All you had to do was show up at Ellis Island and you got right in. It's a different story.

So, with all that being said, I wanted to pass something tonight. I wanted to pass a bill, a law that works for everybody. There's been a lot of back and forth. I've heard some concerns from the sheriff, the DA and they're the ones that might be affected by this to a certain degree. So, we're going to put a pause on this. We're not going to vote on the public hearing tonight. It's going to be pulled. But we are continuing to work on something that we can get passed by knowing that everybody's on board. I think it'll just be easier that way and more effective that way if everybody's on board instead of trying to put something through that some people don't agree with. So that's the decision that was made today, this won't be voted on today, but we are going to continue to work, and there still might be a public hearing in March just like we planned anyway.

Like I said, it's an emotional issue. I feel it myself because of the area that I represent. I'm hopeful that we can pass something that will help stop anything happening here like what we see happening in Minnesota.

We're going to give Legislators a chance to speak before the public and a chance to speak after the public, because some people want to speak at different times. They want to hear from you first and maybe would answer some of your questions and others would like to speak now. So, I'll open the floor to the Legislators that want to speak.

### Comments from Legislators

#### Legislator Alden H. Wolfe

It really is great to see so many people here tonight. I'm sorry that it took such a crazy issue to bring you all out tonight. You're certainly welcome on an average boring night as well. I just want to talk very briefly about governmental process, not politics. I disagree with the decision to pull this resolution to set a date for public hearing tonight, and I just want to explain why. Everything that we do as a Legislature is in the public eye. Everything that we do happens here. You're welcome to be part of it, and that's the way it should be.

I think that, so that you understand, a resolution setting a date for a public hearing is just that. If you vote for that, you're not voting for the law and you're not voting in favor of a particular position. What you're voting for is to give the public the right to speak to us on the record. For those of you that signed up for public participation tonight, under our rules, two minutes per person, maximum of 40 minutes tonight, that's cut to one minute because of the volume of people. So, at best, 40 people are going to get a chance to speak for one minute. I don't know how you're really going to be able to communicate what you want to communicate in that short period of time.

There are other resolutions tonight, setting dates for public hearings on a variety of different topics. At a public hearing, which is on the record with a stenographer, you may come and you may speak as long as you want and there is no end to the list. So, if 500 people show up and we exhaust our meeting time, that means we'll carry that public hearing over to another date. I think that's important and I think that you should think that it's important as well. Whether you and I agree, whether we're on the same page, whether we completely disagree with one another on a particular issue, I still want to hear what you have to say, because when I'm listening to you, my mind isn't made up. There are always different perspectives, and I think that's important.

So, I just wanted to share that I am disappointed that we're not voting tonight to set a date for a public hearing and it has nothing to do with politics. It has everything to do with giving the public the maximum possible voice.

So, with that, I look forward to the next time we have a vote setting a date for a public hearing on this proposal that will, I think, provide tremendous safety not only to undocumented folks, not only to immigrants, but to all of us. I think it's very clear we are all at risk. We are all at risk of a federal agency entering your home with a warrant signed by someone else at that office with guns drawn coming into your home to zip-tie you and cart you away. I'm scared; I am legitimately scared of that and that's why I support this proposal.

I do absolutely recognize there's a lot of different perspectives and I'm looking forward to hearing it. We're going to have a Public Safety committee meeting under the leadership of Legislator Paul Cleary where we'll discuss the language of the of the law, dispel all the nonsense and the rumors that are out there about it.

Read for yourself, make up your own mind. Don't take it from me. Don't take it from anyone else. Thank you.

#### Legislator Dana G. Stilley

As Legislator Wolfe said, we certainly are happy that you have made it inside our chambers, because what you want to say is important to us. I want to voice my opinion about how I believe we should move forward. So, although we're not moving ahead with voting to set a public hearing date tonight for the bill, I fully support this proposed law because the stakes, public safety and human dignity demand nothing less than full transparency and public engagement.

Policies related to ICE enforcement have immediate and real consequences at our local level. They affect whether residents feel safe reporting crimes, whether families trust county institutions, and whether our communities experience stability or fear when local government actions and words, such as off the cuff jokes about checking one's immigration status. It is those things that contribute, whether intentionally or not, to fear and silence public safety, for everyone is weakened.

As a woman who strives every day to be a better Christian, I certainly understand what it means to extend grace, because I know that at some point, I will need grace extended to me. However, it is important that those who have privilege understand the harm that can come from their words and look to develop some cultural competency so that these types of off the cuff remarks simply won't happen.

It is my hope that this body will choose to move forward with transparency and courage. I strongly urge my colleagues here in the Legislature to authorize a public hearing at some time in the future so that this proposal can be evaluated openly, thoughtfully, and with the urgency that public safety and human dignity require. Thank you.

Legislator Beth J. Davidson

Thank you, Mr. Chair, and thank you everyone for coming out tonight and reminding me why I love calling Rockland County home, give yourselves a hand. I also want to give another Amen to Dr. Stille's comments from the Sheriff's Deputy, my friend, Sheriff Deputy Jose Nunez, who waved my car in tonight. To everyone who keeps us safe here in the building, to everyone who's here tonight, to my fellow Legislative colleagues, this is what Rockland County looks like and it's what democracy looks like. So, thank you for being here. Whether you agree with the proposed Safety and Dignity for All Act or anything else on our agenda, we're still a democracy and we all love Rockland County, even if we have different ideas on how to move our community forward. I know I speak for everyone here when I say we value law enforcement, and particularly our Sheriff Lou Falco, as vital partners in our work to make Rockland County the best and safest place to live. Our local law enforcement does a damn good job at keeping us the third safest county in the nation.

For my part, personally, I served for two terms on the Nyack School Board during a time of horrific school shootings around the country, anti-Semitic incidents, a global pandemic and always both relied on and partnered with Clarkstown at the time and South Nyack and Orangetown police departments.

Currently in my role as a County Legislator for District 10 I represent parts of Valley Cottage, the Village of Nyack, Central Nyack, Bardonia, a slice of West Nyack and slice of New city, you're my constituents.

I serve as Co-chair of the Stop Fear Coalition, a partnership between the Center for Safety and Change, our local domestic violence prevention agency, and law enforcement, including Sheriff Falco and our DA Tom Walsh. I am fiercely proud of the lifesaving work and I'm so proud to do it alongside them.

That said, many of our constituents, both in our diverse immigrant communities, are passionate activist communities, not to mention our vital nonprofit partners and regular folks have expressed concern to us about everyone's safety, as our Majority Leader, Alden Wolfe. So, correctly said, in this volatile moment for our country, where we are seeing people terrorized and even killed by rogue ICE agents who don't live in or know the communities in which they're placed, that everyone includes asylum seekers, naturalized citizens, domestic violence victims, food insecure families, protesters and nonprofit partners who worry about increased liability as a result of client information that could be shared with ICE.

The Safety and Dignity for All Act is intended to address those concerns while honoring state and federal judicial warrants and following the law. As you've heard, this law has been on the books in Westchester for eight years. Crime has actually gone down in the last four years in Westchester County, and we believe we're improving on it as we've already started to work on it and it is still in the planning stages here in Rockland. And we plan, as it has been said, a fully transparent and collaborative process with law enforcement, nonprofit partners, fellow elected, and anyone else who was impacted. I echo everyone else, please come out and participate as we move this law forward. We wouldn't be pursuing this law if we didn't believe it would make everyone safer and our county employees more effective.

I want to thank the nonprofit and municipal partners who have already stepped up to support us in this work. I thank you all again for caring enough to come out tonight and being such an engaged part of the county we all love.

Legislator Paul C. Cleary

Good evening, thanks for coming out. This is what democracy looks like. Whether you support this bill or don't support this bill, I'm glad every one of you came here to make your voices heard. Unfortunately, there's only 40 minutes. I'm not going to take up a bunch of time. We have got a lot of people here. I echo the sentiments of all my friends here. As Chairman of Public Safety committee, I've been watching this nightmare happen in Minneapolis and my granddaughter asked me, (she thinks I'm in charge of something) what I was and why don't I fix this? I told her I'm not in charge, I'm Chairman of Public Safety committee and I'm doing my best.

I'll continue to do my best and we will continue the fight to push this forward and get it across the line with all parties involved. We're going to have the best bill we can. Thank you all for coming.

Legislator Itamar J. Yeger

I just want to thank you all for coming. I was reminded to look up the story of the MS Saint Louis, which some of you might be aware of and some of you might not. It was a ship of German Jews that left Europe in 1939 and tried to find refuge in this hemisphere. They were turned away from Cuba, from the United States and from Canada. They ended up having to go back to Europe where some countries took some of them. It's documented that about 250 of the over 900 people on that ship died in the concentration camps in Europe. It's not the same thing that's going on in the United States today. I don't want to say that there's a comparison between what happened in Nazi Germany, they were looking for people to kill, to put into gas chambers and turn to ashes. And at least so far, that's not what's happening in the United States.

We have to be realistic about what's really going on here. On the other hand, it does give me a certain sense of what we should be doing to welcome the stranger, not the criminal. After reviewing the Westchester law, we made some amendments with the agreement of many of the people on this podium tonight, we wrote out those sections that allowed criminals to be able to avoid the consequences of their actions. So, if somebody tells you that the law drafted includes allowing criminals to go free, you can tell them that Itamar Yeger said "that's not true".

I just want to leave you with the thought that I still believe that this is the greatest country in the world. Perhaps that's because unlike many, many other countries, Jews have not been thrown out of the United States yet. I'd like to see us be a better and kinder and nicer and safer place and that's what hopefully this will do. Thank you.

Legislator Jesse M. Malowitz

I just wanted to mention something administratively as well. Before serving on this body, I worked for two different members of Congress in constituent service, and one of the most common issues we saw was immigration. There were people calling on behalf of family members that were sponsored. Their applications had been pending one year, two years, three years and as Chairman, Hood said, some of them eight years. It's not as easy as it seems and it's not as easy as some of our forebears had when they first came here. We have seen some unfortunate things happen right here in Rockland County.

It wasn't that long ago that a Spring Valley High School kid was taken at an appearance at his Immigration Court hearing. Somebody who was doing everything the right way did not stop him from being targeted. Something tells me that he was not taken with a judicial warrant, and judicial warrants are required in every case, it forces people to have a valid reason.

Like my colleague, Legislator Yeger said, this does not stop the removal of criminals. This does not tie anybody's hands from conducting law enforcement. It does not stop cooperation even with ICE.

We are a County Legislative body. It does not affect town or village law enforcement either. What I hope with this delay is that we can bring all stakeholders together, have an honest conversation about what's in this legislation that people may or may not agree with, and try to find common ground. I know this was not an easy decision, but I hope that we can all come together and find something that works best for everyone that makes Rockland the best place to live for everyone. Thank you.

Legislator Raymond W. Sheridan III

Chair, I agree with the sentiment of my fellow Legislators here. The civil discourse, whatever side you're on for this, it's important that we're here. We listen to each other and get to some sort of neighborhood agreement. I think if you know me, whether it's professionally or personally or you're just seeing me here for the first time as a Legislator, I try to look at things through a commonsense lens. I'm a pretty even keeled person. I'm not scared to say that I don't have all the answers and I don't know everything. That being said, I think it's important and shows leadership, not weakness, to lean on people who've sat in the chair who have a better understanding of a job than I do. It's not a lie and it's not misinformation to say that the Chiefs of Police, the County PBA and the Sheriff all said that this bill will make the County less safe.

I don't think that this county is perfect, and there's a lot of work that we can all do here. But this bill is not going forward because we have to let our police do their job and take their input. I look forward to working together on something that we can come to an agreement on. So, I want to thank you all again for coming out and thank you for the time.

Legislator Aney Paul

Thank you everyone for coming here today. This turnout shows that everyone is part of making policies or legislation in the county, where you live, work and raise your family. It is very important that you all showed up, asked questions and inquired about what is happening in the County or at the Legislature.

Al Magnatta, a proud World Watch II veteran and a man whose life was defined by service, passed away just last week. He was 100 years old. Al served with a deep love for his community. After returning home from the war, he devoted decades to fire and emergency services in Rockland County, joining the Congers Fire Department and eventually serving as a Fire Chief. His impact on public safety and community preparedness was lasting and deeply respected. I request we adjourn in the name of Alfred Lawrence Magnatta. Thank you.

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### **Comments from Legislators continued**

#### Legislator Lon M. Hofstein

So, I would appreciate it if you would give me the same respect that I've given to you, all of you, and listen to what you've had to say. The County Executive, the Sheriff Department heads and law enforcement leadership already possess the authority and discretion to establish internal policies governing how county personnel respond to ICE detainer requests, information sharing and releasing notifications consistent with the Constitution and existing law. That discretion is not incidental; it is their job. As a Legislative body, our role should be to respect and support that independent decision-making grounded in experience, professional judgement and the separation of powers that serve as a foundational check and balance in our system of government. This proposed law potentially abandons those bedrock principles.

It sends a troubling message to our county employees and executive agencies that we as a Legislative body know better than you. I trust our partners in government and law enforcement to make sound decisions and implement appropriate policies without this body needlessly dictating what they may or may not do. As even the bill's proponents have acknowledged, ICE detainers are requests, not mandates. Counties are already under no legal obligation to honor them absent from judicial process. This bill therefore fills no legal gap. Instead, it converts what is probably a matter of executive judgment and professional discretion into a rigid statutory mandate.

By legislating away discretion, this proposal undermines the very individuals' best position to make real time, fact specific decisions involving public safety, intergovernmental cooperation and legal compliance. Statutory prohibition strips county employees and law enforcement professionals of the ability to exercise judgement in complex or evolving circumstances. They even where cooperation may be lawful, appropriate or prudent.

Now, I've listened to what the people have said, and I respect your opinion and I have been told over the years, and even Michael Grant said I was one of the more reasonable Republicans and I think Brooke Malloy and Joe Coe could attest to that. I remember the first time I went to a Pride gathering, when I was the first-year Minority Leader and before I went up on the stage, there was an elected official from the Democratic Party who will remain nameless, who made a comment to me that we've never seen a member of the Minority here. I got up on stage that day and I repeated what that individual said to me and I said as long as you welcome me here, I will be at every function that you want me to be. They've had legislation affecting the LGBTQ plus community, and I watched Brooke Malloy catching flies when she saw I voted in favor and went against the stream.

Now, having said all that, I've also listened to how the people here respect the Sheriff and local law enforcement and they take pride in the law enforcement community that we have here in Rockland County. So why is it that we feel that we need to put a law in place to restrict their decision making? Now, I'm not here to debate this right now.

So, my point is this, we have spoken with law enforcement. Unfortunately, as far as access to the law, the public probably had more access to it than the members of the Minority. There have been continuous changes, and we've not been privileged to it. This quite frankly started out the wrong way in a rush to put this as a public hearing. A proposed law should have been in place. That's not the way to start out and then changes were made and members of the Minority were not made aware of what they are.

I get it is about party politics. Someone made a comment, a few people about their side, our side and that's part of the problem. If you listen to some of the words that people here in the audience were using, you're fueling the fire yourselves. You talk about the Republicans; they're the evil empire, so to speak. I've heard comments like their side and our side or that side and this one that was said, it doesn't matter.

We're entitled to have differences of opinion. We have spoken with members of law enforcement who feel that this is unnecessary. People are quoting what happened in Minneapolis. That's not Rockland County. If you in fact believe in law enforcement, as I've heard, then you will trust their judgement and they have made it very clear, the various departments, the Sheriff's Department, the local police departments, that they don't feel that this is necessary. They don't feel this will help them. If anything, no pun intended, it will handcuff them in performing their duties to protect all of us.

So, we need to take a deep breath, think about all this. I appreciate you listening to me and I will be prepared to listen to criticism that's coming afterwards. That comes with terrain, but I can assure you that members of the Minority don't come here with a preconceived notion. We do try to get information, and we do speak with others. Yes, we are strong supporters of law enforcement, as we all should be, and it's been their recommendation that we don't need this type of legislation. I'm not going to tell the professional how to do their job. If they do something wrong, then we've got to deal with it. People being murdered, no one could accept that poor behavior and we do not condone that, and that must be dealt with, but there are ways and we have laws to do that.

Thank you all for your time and I thank you all for coming out. We can agree to disagree from time to time. That doesn't make us all bad or any of us bad. Thank you very much for listening to me.

#### Legislator Toney L. Earl

I'd like to say that this group has really made me proud. I've been in the Legislature for quite a while, and this is a great crowd here tonight.

Legislator Paul and I, our districts, are probably the most diversified districts in the county per capita. We've seen the expressions and the hurt feelings of our constituents and it's not a happy picture. It is a very sad picture.

The bill here tonight we started working on yesterday as a group and critiquing it, and I saw some things that I would like to change, have changed and I think that you'll be proud of the changes. These are changes that all of us pretty much agreed upon.

We will make this happen; you have my word on that. I'm very proud of all of you for coming out tonight and standing up for democracy.

Legislator Itamar J. Yeger

Legislator Hofstein and I have developed a very, very good working relationship over the last little while, especially since I became the Chair of the Budget and Finance Committee. I'm really sorry about these types of processes when it comes to local laws in general, because really these things should go to committees first, which I've said on several occasions. I've suggested actually that we change our rules so that these things go to committees for discussion before they go on to the Full Legislature for a vote. I'd like to encourage my colleagues to do that again.

I also agree with Legislator Hofstein, that the sheriff should have the discretion to do what's right in any individual case. And that's why when I changed the Westchester Law into the Rockland Law, I put in a section that includes that the sheriff in any individual case may exercise his discretion to overcome the law and do what he deems to be right in any individual case. So, that's already the law. The sheriff deserves discretion, and I don't know how many of you have dealt with Sheriff Falco, but I think he's fantastic and he does a great job and so do the deputies in the back of the room. Let's give them a hand and thank them for keeping us safe.

Hopefully they never have to keep us safe from ICE. They are keeping us one of the safest places to live in the United States.

I love the fact that I have bears in my backyard I'm still less than an hour from a Broadway show without traffic. I love this place. I'm really happy to be living here. I'm happy that we raised our family here. It's a really nice place and I want to continue that.

The sheriff will have full discretion. No criminal will be able to avoid ICE. And so that's the story. Thank you very much.

Legislator Alden H. Wolfe

We have an addendum tonight where we are being asked to vote to waive our rules, to vote on three items to set dates for three public hearings for Legislation that have not been finalized, discussed or been to committee yet. So, I will be supporting this because I support public input. But keep in mind, make no mistake, voting for a public hearing is very, very important and it is not the same as voting for the underlying law.

Legislator Beth J. Davidson

Chair, I will keep this very short. I just want to thank everyone who came out tonight. I want to thank everyone who spoke. I want to thank my colleagues and yes, law enforcement who protected us. Leadership is about doing the right thing, even when it's hard, especially when it's hard. And I want to remind everyone here, we work for you, so hold us accountable. Make sure you, if you feel, if you know someone who can't be here tonight, make sure they send us an e-mail, make sure they make a phone call. We will keep track of this because we want to do the right thing for all of us here in Rockland County.

So, thank you again for coming here tonight. We appreciate you.

Legislator Philip Soskin

We're here tonight not so much to talk about our past experiences, but to talk about trying to reassure you, all of you, that we're here to ease your fright. I didn't serve in the Army for two years in France to come back to something like this, no matter where we are, be it in the United States, be it in France, be it in Germany, and to all the other countries that I visited while on the service, everybody hated Americans, everybody hated Jews. Fortunate or not, I fit that description, so I know what it's like to feel that way. People hate you. You have good people; you have bad people all over the world. If you see something, say something. Don't be afraid.

Fortunately, we have the best police in Rockland County, and I've received a notice that was issued by the Police Commissioners, Police Chiefs and/or Police Association that one of the Legislators handed out to us telling us that they also have full authority in Rockland County to take care of their areas.

We are all working to help you make you feel good. It makes me very good to see all of you here today.

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**Comments from the Chairperson**

Chairman Jay Hood, Jr.

So, it's already floating around Facebook - Mike Lawler declares a decisive victory is already on Facebook. I mean, he couldn't even wait till the meeting was over. So, part of me would like to set the date tonight, but I have already said I will work with law enforcement to get this to a place where everybody can agree. So, I'm going to do that and we're all going to do that together with the Minority. I promised that I wouldn't set date tonight, so I'm not going to full transparency.

I'd like anybody to read that law and say it's lunacy. I mean, is that a little bit of hyperbole or what? I don't know. We need better. We need better from Congressman Lawler. What we need is not declaring victory on a small County law when he represents a much greater area. We need him to go to Washington and fix the immigration system and allow people to become citizens easier. There are so many things you can do. You have the White House, you have the Senate, you have the House. Do something instead of using it as an issue, which is what I see. I see no even effort to fix anything, and I have a problem with that. I want to go on record with that. So that's what I want to say about what I see there, and I hope that something's done, because things could be so much better if it fixed the immigration system since you want to close the border. They're here so let them become citizens.

A couple of things came up about the economy, and you have to be the most ignorant person in the world if you want all immigrants out. The economy would fall apart. Your life would be so much worse. You have no idea. You are a complete fool if that's what you want. And then I hear, well, we must be against law enforcement. I have got to go back a few years now when our County Executive came into office, and he's probably not going to like that I mentioned this, but it's the fact of what happened back in the day, because we were in rough shape with finances where we had \$100 million deficit. All these things were going on, the hospital was draining us, all that stuff. The budget that came over cut 38 police officers from the Sheriff's division. The Democrats stood up and said, no, that's not going to happen. So that's where we stand with law enforcement. We made sure they kept their jobs. They kept us safe. And I feel the same way today, years later. So don't believe it, it is just scare tactic after scare tactic.

I have to thank the Sheriffs for being here. Thank you for everything that you do and please thank Lou Falco when you see him.

Lastly, I think we would be remiss if we did not thank the major sponsors of this law, Beth, Dana, Alden, Jesse, and Paul. Thank you for bringing this to us, and I apologize that it's not moving faster and maybe the way everybody wants, but let's take the next step. Let's work with law enforcement. Let's get everybody on board and let's pass something. Thank you again for all coming out.

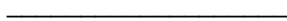

THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF ROCKLAND, NEW YORK, HEREBY RESOLVES (by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all the members of said Legislature) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Based upon the review of this action by the County of Rockland (herein called the "County"), the Legislature of the County is hereby authorized to continue existing Capital Project No. 8330 for the Department of General Services, Facilities Management, consisting of the RCC Brucker Hall Roof Replacement Project, all as more particularly described in the County's 2026 Capital Budget. The estimated maximum cost thereof, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, is \$2,500,000 and \$1,000,000 is hereby appropriated therefor in addition to the \$1,500,000 heretofore appropriated for such purpose pursuant to Resolution No. 181 of 2022 duly adopted on April 5, 2022 (the "Previously Appropriated Funds"). The plan of financing includes the expenditure of the Previously Appropriated Funds and the issuance of \$1,000,000 bonds of the County herein authorized, in addition to the \$1,000,000 authorized but unissued remaining bonds previously authorized therefor, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of such bonds to finance said appropriation, and if not paid from other sources, the levy and collection of taxes on all the taxable real property in the County to pay the principal of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same shall become due and payable, and authorizing any funds to be received from the United States of America to be expended towards the cost of such object or purpose or redemption of the County's obligations issued therefor, or to be budgeted as an offset to the taxes for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds.

Section 2. Bonds of the County in the principal amount of \$1,000,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (herein called the "Law") to finance said appropriation. The plan for the financing of such maximum estimated cost is by the issuance of \$2,500,000 bonds of said County hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, to be reduced by State funds expected to be received in the amount of \$1,250,000, and further reduced by \$200,000 appropriated from the general fund pursuant to Res. No 320-23.

Section 3. The period of probable usefulness to the purpose for which said \$1,000,000 bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 12(a)(1) of the Law is twenty-five (25) years.

Section 4. The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds may be applied to reimburse the County for expenditures made after the effective date of this resolution for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.

Section 5. Each of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, shall contain the recital of validity as prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Law and said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, shall be general obligations of the County, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax from all sources upon all the taxable real property within the County without limitation as to rate or amount. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, and provision shall be made annually in the budget of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the bonds and any notes in anticipation thereof to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 6. Subject to the provisions of this resolution and of the Law and pursuant to the provisions of Section 21.00 thereof relative to the authorization of the issuance of bonds having substantially level or declining annual debt service, Section 30.00 thereof relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and Sections 50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 thereof, the powers and duties of the County Legislature relative to authorizing bond anticipation notes, or the renewals thereof, and relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, and prescribing the terms, form and contents, and as to the sale and issuance of the bonds herein authorized, and of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, and the renewals of said notes, as well as to executing agreements for credit enhancements, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance, the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of such resolution, or a summary thereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

- (c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the constitution.

Section 8. This bond resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2.02 of the Rockland County Charter, and the Clerk to the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to publish the foregoing resolution, in summary, together with a Notice attached in substantially the form prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law of the State of New York in the "ROCKLAND JOURNAL NEWS," published in West Nyack, New York said newspaper having been designated the official newspaper of said County for such publication and may publish a notice of said hearing in any or all the designated supplemental newspaper of the County together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law of the State of New York.

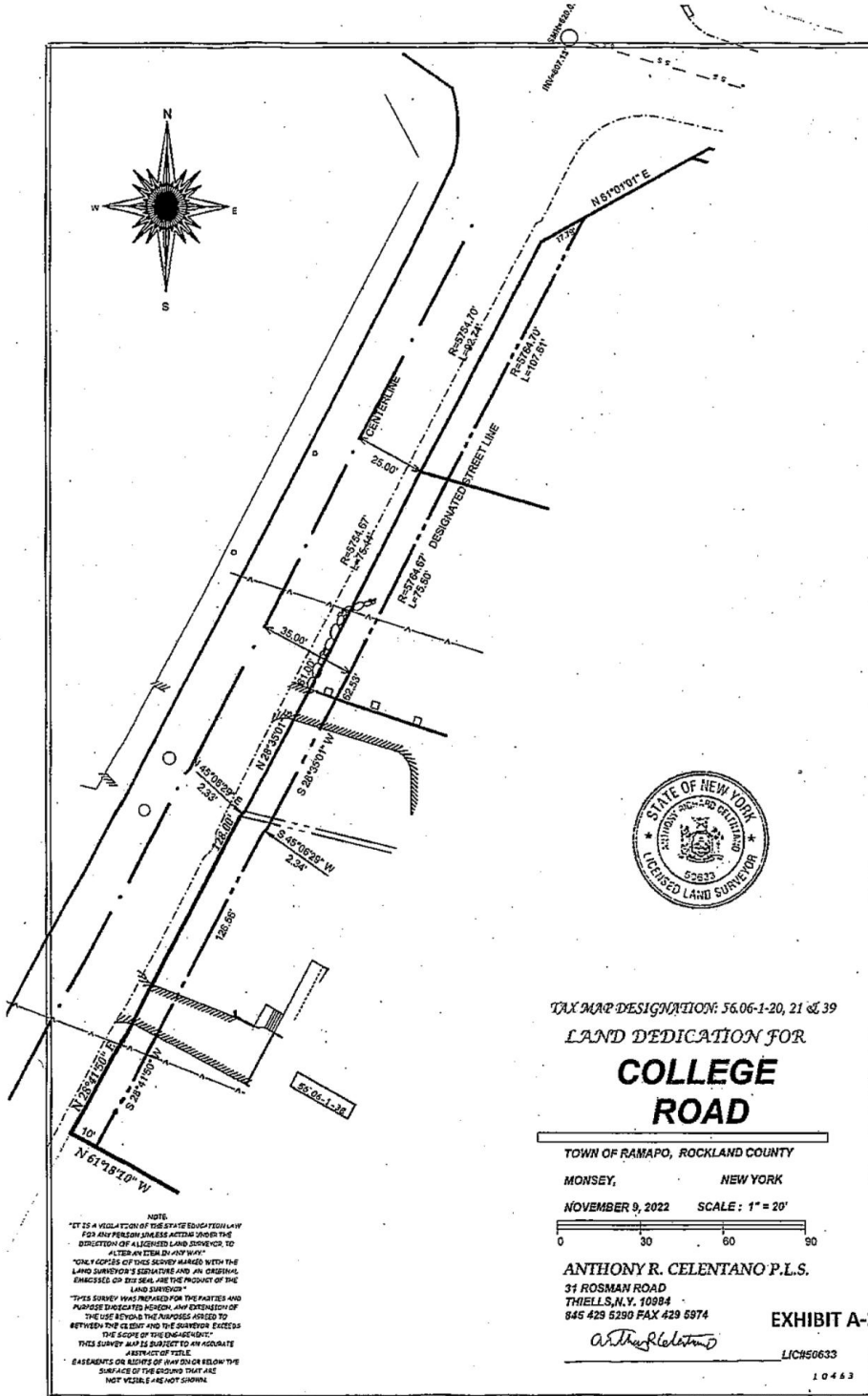
